

Heavers Farm Primary School Pupil Premium Grant Statement 2018/19

Pupil premium is additional funding to help schools close the attainment gap between children from low-income and other disadvantaged families and their peers. If a child has been eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any point over the past 6 years or has been continuously looked after for at least 6 months (LAC) the school receives an amount per head within their budget.

This funding is provided to enable these pupils to be supported to reach their potential. Pupil Premium funding represents a significant proportion of our budget and we are committed to ensuring it is spent to maximum effect.

Main Barriers to Educational Achievement

During the 2017/18 academic year, through analysing the data available to the school leaders and governors, we identified the following barriers to educational achievement for disadvantaged children in our school:

- Lack of academic progress between KS1 and KS2 when compared to national statistics
- Lack of access to resources to support learning, *e.g. books; sports kits; outdoor spaces*
- Poor health literacy
- Poor living conditions, including not enough resources to purchase uniform, not enough access to food, inadequate sleeping arrangements
- Lack of access to extra-curricular activities, *e.g. school journey; extra-curricular clubs*
- Poor attendance
- Low levels of parental engagement
- Social and emotional needs that affect learning

Pupil Premium Spending 2018/19

Taking into account the main barriers to educational achievement faced by disadvantaged pupils in our school, we will address these in the following ways:

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| School Trips | Every class goes on three school trips per year. These are subsidised by the school. | All | £ 3,000 |

| Instrumental Music Tuition | We offer instrumental music tuition free of charge for those on low incomes. | Key Stage 2 | £ 7,500 |
| Breakfast Provision | We provide porridge for all families to ensure that all children get breakfast at the start of the day. | All | £ 4,500 |
| Youth Club for Current and Ex-Pupils | We provide a "Youth Club" twice a week for children in Years 6, 7 and 8 who either attend or attended our school. This helps with issues outside of school and local risks. | Year 6 | £ 7,000 |

In order to monitor the impact and effect of the Pupil Premium Grant on disadvantaged pupils, we will:

- Monitor academic achievement at the end of each Key Stage using the Analyse School Performance reports on disadvantaged pupils
- Monitor academic achievement of disadvantaged children throughout the year through regular data packs and pupil progress meetings. These include the class teachers, SLT and Federation Year Group Leaders.
- Early identification of children that would benefit social, behavioural and emotional support
- Monitoring by the SLT and SENCo of those who would benefit from behaviour support
- Monitoring by attendance team to analyse impact of the Pupil Premium spending on improving attendance for disadvantaged children

Pupil Premium Funding and the impact of this is a regular item on the governors' School Improvement Committee. The impact and review of the Pupil Premium strategy will take place with the Senior Leadership Team and Governing Body on the following dates during the 2018/19 academic year:
